How you can prevent anti-black racism

FUN FACT: Did you know that black people are stopped by police at 6 times the rate of White people in the United Kingdom and Asians at almost twice the rate of Whites? Well, it's true! This is one of the millions of examples of racism.

WHAT IS RACISM:

You might be wondering, what is racism? Well, racism is the discrimination against people of a specific race/ethical group. In other words: when you kind of separate people into groups by their race, and treat people differently depending on the group they are in. People who perform racism are racist. You should try your best not to be racist. Here are questions related to racism:

- Why do people have different skin colors?
- Why does it matter that some people are black and some are white?
- How did racism start?
- Why did racism start?

HOW TO STOP RACISM:

We need to stop racism! You can stop racism by doing simple things, like making friends with people of different skin color. You go to the checkout, and the employee says that you cannot shop here because of your race. I bet that you would feel deeply upset. That's exactly what's probably happening somewhere in the world! People might also feel like they are not appreciated and they might start to copy others, instead of being themselves.

PREVENTING AND ACKNOWLEDGING RACISM:

There are many more ways of stopping racism. One is to prevent it from happening in the first place. By doing this, you are stopping it before it happens, so even if someone is racist, it will not be as bad(but you should still try to help!). Another popular method of racism is knowing it when you see it, so that 1) you can stop it fast, 2) you are not being racist yourself, and 3) you can make sure it is real racism, and not just someone asking another person's opinion on how to describe racism or something like that.

You're walking down the street, returning from work or school, and you see an African-Canadian boy, maybe in his teens, is being verbally and physically abused by a handful of others his age. This is not an isolated incident.

Of the 1,198,540 black people in Canada, a whopping 83% have experienced discrimination. To stop this regularly occurring anti-black racism, first, we must understand why people are racist. Next, we can figure out how we can help stop racism. Then, we will explore what we have done or are doing in the fight against anti-black racism. Racism is thriving, and we must work together to confront anti-black racism.

It's the age-old question. Why are people racist? The thing we all must remember is that racism doesn't just appear, it is taught. It's taught through many things, such as television, family teachings, etc. There are many racist TV shows that millions of people watch, in which they weave a portrait saving that it is completely fine to be racist. This is how racism is cultivated. Once society watches that, they go out and hurt others, and racism continues. Also, there are many stereotypes about black people in our world, and through these stereotypes, we begin to judge unfairly. As another example, when going to work or trying to get a job, many people judge them for their clothes or hair, and they are regarded as 'unprofessional' or 'improper'. White supremacy is a big thing, and started way back when Africans were being enslaved by Europeans; slavery only ended only in 1865, and white supremacy continues to date. Another big reason is judging and thinking you are better than everyone else. We, as humans, like to hang out with 'our group' or people who are like us, and then we like to think we are better than others. Also, if anything wrong happens, we look to blame, and people who look or talk differently than ourselves tend to be the target, though this is inherently wrong. These are just a few reasons discrimination is prevalent in our world.

Now that we have identified some reasons for racism, we can find solutions. The best way in our current society is to inform and educate people, and the biggest way to do that is through social media 3.96 billion people around the world use social media, so it has a large reach. By sharing informational posts on how to tackle discrimination, we can educate tons. If you posted something on your story on Instagram, it would get about 1000-3000 views. If 100 people posted something on anti-black racism, about 300,000 people would be more educated. So that's a place to start. Another way we can help in the fight against racism is through the education system. We must teach children when they are young to oppose the idea of racism. We must teach youth to identify and change discriminatory ways, stopping them and future generations from committing this unspeakable crime. Once we are educated, we must speak up and make a change. Another main reason why racism is continuing is that people are not speaking up against it. So, be an ally to the cause. Don't allow it to continue. Be an upstander, not a bystander. It will both stop the racist person and make them understand why it's wrong to be racist. If it is systemic racism, protest. For example, after the unjust killing of George Floyd, people around the world started to protest this evil and tell the government to stop racist ways and instead, help us become one big. diverse, community. Everyone must join the fight against racism, by educating themselves, informing others, and standing up for justice.

Did you know that Markham was a part of the underground railroad? That's right. The citizens of Markham were, and are, devoted to equality. Markham has recently updated its Diversity Action Plan, Everyone Welcome, and we now have a special advisor on all kinds of racism. Markham has also agreed to be a part of UNESCO's CMARD (Coalition of Municipalities Against Racism and Discrimination). We are also one of the fastest-growing and culturally diverse municipalities. 57% of our population was born abroad, and 65% of people in our municipality are visible minorities! Also, 97% of City staff and Members of Council completed the "Let's Talk about Racism: An Introduction to Anti-Black Racism" course. York region, similarly, has an Inclusion Charter, a community initiative that brings together businesses, community organizations, municipalities, police services, hospitals, school boards, conservation authorities and agencies to create an inclusive environment with equality for everyone here. There is also a dismantling anti-black racism strategy for schools that will be deployed over 5 years. York region has also started the Black Experience Project (BEP), to collect information and then use it to stop anti-black racism and racial discrimination. Many efforts are in place, but all of us must take initiative to confront racism through the methods outlined above.

Overall, nobody should ever become an object of racism, and it is our job to make sure of that. In conclusion, I have discussed why people are racist, methods to prevent racism, and current courses of action. While some people do advocate against stopping anti-black racism, many others are still falling victim to it. Let's get out there and work together to make a change.




Hello There! Today we will be looking into Racism. So, what is Racism?




