What I like most:

 Being outdoors all year round and day to day interaction with people on my route.

Tips to make my day:

- Have blue boxes at the curb by 7:00 a.m.
- Do not put plastic bags, styrofoam, wood, wire hangers, or small appliances in the blue box.
- Follow the collection schedule that the *Town of Markham*

Strangest item I have ever seen out for collection:

- Two truck air brake chambers
- Full body, replica, medieval armour

Pet Peeve:

• When the collector leaves something behind in your bins that means he can't take them. Please don't put them back for the next week. Call Markham to find the proper way to dispose of those items.

What's up with styrofoam?

The Region of York determines what materials can be accepted in Markham's blue box and is responsible for processing and marketing Markham's blue box recyclables — including plastic. The Region cannot properly process styrofoam at this time, but it can be recycled at Markham's recycling depots.

Licence Required! Markham now requires all lawn and tree care providers be licensed by the Town.



Watch For Signs

Lawn care providers are required by the Ministry of the Environment to post these signs even if the product is permitted by the Markham Pesticide By-law. Check the back of the sign to see what has been applied. If the information is missing you can report it to the Ministry of the Environment by calling 1-800-376-4547.



The Town now requires lawn care providers to also post a Markham sign beside the provincial sign indicating the products applied comply with the Pesticide By-law. A yellow sign indicates that a property has been treated with permitted low impact products. The red sign warns that a pesticide application has been permitted to treat an infestation.

Treat Grub and Chinch Bug Infestations

The Town's By-law permits pesticides to control chinch bug and grub infestation in 2008 if you or your lawn care provider submits an application to the Town. If you suspect an infestation follow these steps:

1. Monitor Your Lawn

- For grubs, look for dead patches in your lawn. Because grubs feed on grass roots, the grass will pull back easily. Damage occurs mainly in the fall and to a lesser degree in the spring.
- Chinch bugs attack the grass blade and create sunken patches of dead grass. Damage is usually noticeable in August.

2. Test for grubs (especially early August)

• With a knife, carefully cut three sides of a square (approximately 1 sq ft) at the outer edge of the brown patch, peel back the grass to look for grubs.

Test for chinch bugs (mid to late July)

- Cut off both ends of a large can 20 25 cm (8 9 inches) in diameter (i.e. coffee can).
- Push the can halfway down into the lawn at the edge of the damaged area.
- Fill the can with water and wait a few minutes to see if chinch bugs float to the top.
- Count the number of chinch bugs.

3. Determine if you have an infestation

- Grub Infestation: on a well-watered lawn — 15 grubs per 30 cm² (approx. 1 sq ft) on a poorly watered lawn -5-10 grubs per 30 cm² (approx. 1 sq ft)
- Chinch bug infestation 20 chinch bugs per can

4. If you have an infestation:

- Fill out the Town's infestation application form (available on the Town's website or the licensing counter at the Civic Centre)
- Submit the form to the licensing counter or fax to 905-305-5980 two business days before applying pesticides

Pesticide By-Law

The Pesticide By-law applies to everyone. So remember this when you are purchasing your lawn and garden products at retail stores and garden centres

and when choosing a lawn care operator. Here are some things to know:

- Grow a healthy, natural lawn it will be more resistant to pests and
 - Get used to a few dandelions, weeds and insects. Most insects are beneficial. Some weeds are attractive. All are important to our environment.
 - Control weeds and insects naturally by digging out weeds and their roots by hand. Try pouring boiling water on weeds that are growing between patio stones.

THERE ARE ALTERNATIVES

Stores still sell products that are NOT permitted under the by-law. Here is the list of permitted low impact products/ingredients:

- Acetic acid

Always look at the front product label beside the word "Guarantee" to check if that product/ingredient is permitted. If you are using professional lawn and tree care services ask to see the list of the products/ ingredients they will be using. and their uses. Top Tips for a Healthy Lawn

1. Mow high: 7.5cm (3")

2.5cm (1") per week

Fertilize in late fall

4. Overseed: Select a good quality grass seed mix

5 Aerate in spring or fall

Business Recycling – Why Not?

Waste generated by businesses and schools is considered to be 'private enterprise waste' and is regulated by the Province of Ontario, not municipalities. In 1994, the Province passed a law that requires businesses, apartment buildings and schools to recycle. In response to the growing complaints about the lack of recycling in the business sector, the Ministry of the Environment recently carried out a provincewide inspection blitz of 260 businesses. The results were not encouraging. In some sectors, the inspectors couldn't find a single company in compliance. Almost 93% of the inspected businesses were found to be out of compliance with the recycling regulation. In fact, most businesses were not even aware that they had to recycle.

Traditionally, municipalities have taken a 'hands-off' approach to business recycling and have let market forces rule. The low cost of disposal in Michigan and New York has meant that many businesses do not want to pay 'extra' to recycle and have ignored the recycling regulation.

Many smaller businesses want to recycle but unfortunately, the municipal recycling infrastructure collection vehicles, recycling and composting facilities cannot handle the extra recyclables from thousands of business generators.

The reality is that as long as there is cheap disposal, business have little financial incentive to recycle.

	Apartment Buildings	> 6 units

In 2007, Markham's Customer Service staff answered 225,951 calls. Of these, 4,519 were collection inquiries. Here are possible answers to your number one question:

Why were my materials not collected?

- Have your materials set out by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day. There is no scheduled collection time.
- We get calls, you get answers
- Make sure your garbage, blue box and green bins do not weigh more than 40 lbs each. Place your overflow organics in a clear plastic bag and place the bag beside
- Green bins are left behind when the organic material is not contained in bags or we find non-organic material such as plastic containers in the green bin. Ensure your organics are in tightly sealed bags.
- Appliances and scrap metal items are collected by appointment only. Please do not set appliances and scrap metal at the curb until the day before your scheduled collection. Please call 905.415.7535 to book and pay for your collection appointment.

Zero Waste Hints

- When choosing a product, check if the packaging is recyclable, compostable or reusable.
- ✓ Reduce waste as much as you can by not buying products in packages that can only go into the
- ✓ When you're able to reduce, do it! For example, instead of using a paper towel when cleaning up a mess, try a J-cloth or other reusable towel.
 - **✓** Buy less disposable-type products. We know disposables are convenient. But with the environment, convenience is often deadly.
 - ✓ Instead of using daily wipes to clean your face - 365 daily wipes times 30 million Canadians try some soap, water and a towel instead!
 - ✓ Complain about bad packaging go ahead and contact the company.
